INTRODUCTION

What is the Jefferson Votes Initiative?

Jefferson Votes is a nonpartisan civic engagement initiative spearheaded by nonprofit partners of the Jefferson Regional Foundation.

Through the Jefferson Community Collaborative, which is an investment of the Foundation, nonprofit stakeholders and Foundation staff have developed resources for the purpose of encouraging increased voter participation. Informed and active voters are critical in working to increase the health of communities.

The objective of the Jefferson Votes initiative is to leverage local organizations as trusted community resources to achieve the following outcomes:

- Offer resources to community partners to promote voter registration and participation within the communities served by Jefferson Hospital.
- Increase confidence and access to the voting process.
- Raise enthusiasm and engagement in the region in the civic process to promote a more inclusive community and equitable access to resources.

What is the purpose of the toolkit?

The <u>Jefferson Votes</u> Toolkit is one piece of the nonpartisan initiative created by the Jefferson Regional Foundation and the 100+ partner strong Jefferson Community Collaborative. The Jefferson Collaborative is excited to provide targeted, nonpartisan resources and training for nonprofit organizations in the Jefferson area. Within this Toolkit, you will find ready-to-use materials specifically created for the Jefferson Votes initiative to support nonpartisan voter engagement efforts. Included are also voter engagement resources from Nonprofit VOTE, National Voter Registration Day and the Pennsylvania Department of State.

Election FAQs

Who can vote in PA?

- · Individuals who have been citizens for at least 1 month.
- Individuals 18 years or older who have been a resident of PA and the district at least 30 days prior to the election.
- Some individuals with a criminal status or history may qualify to vote. Refer to vote.pa.gov for more information on these criteria.
- Register to vote! Voter registration takes 5 minutes and can be done online at <u>vote.pa.gov</u>, in person at the Allegheny County election offices or through the mail.
- Know your candidate. Visit the candidate's website for their political positions. Campaign <u>finance</u> information and past voting records are available to the public.
 - **Voting is secure and easy.** There are several safeguards to making voting accessible and secure: new voting systems, post-election audits, layered set of protections, strategic data sharing, collaboration and communication, ongoing training.

General Election Polling Information

- Polls are open **7:00am 8:00pm** to allow for ease in voting. Anyone in line by **8:00pm** will be allowed to vote.
- The <u>Polling Place Search Tool</u> will assist with locating a polling place for Election day.




